# CITY OF WEST PALM BEACH OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK REGULAR CITY COMMISSION MEETING March 21, 2022

The City Commission of the City of West Palm Beach met in regular session on Monday, March 21, 2022, at 5:02 p.m., at City Hall, with the following persons present:

Mayor Keith James, President of the Commission Joseph Peduzzi, Commissioner Christina Lambert, Commissioner Kelly Shoaf [arrived at 5:14 p.m.], and Commissioner Shalonda Warren, City Administrator Faye Johnson, City Attorney Kimberly Rothenburg, and City Clerk Hazeline Carson. Absent: Commissioner Christy Fox.

#### 1. CALL TO ORDER:

#### 2. MOMENT OF SILENCE:

Mayor James requested a moment of silence and asked everyone to think about the situation in Ukraine. He also said that Commissioner Christy Fox lost her mother and asked everyone to keep her and her family in their thoughts.

#### 3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

Commissioner Peduzzi led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor James read the civility and decorum code into the record.

Mayor James read the proclamation into the record and presented it to Diana Stanley.

Ms. Stanley thanked the Mayor and the Commissioners for the proclamation and for their continued partnership. She provided information on the SleepOut Homelessness Awareness Day and said that this is the 15<sup>th</sup> year. She said that they are in the midst of construction of their \$10 million facility here in the City of West Palm Beach which will be the beacon of homelessness for those experiencing homelessness and it is a new facility on Australian Avenue.

Faye Johnson, City Administrator, discussed the request to use general fund dollars to purchase two vehicles for the Fire Department as follows: overview; urgent critical vehicle needs; \$2,501,760 expenditure-2 fire trucks; \$2,501,760 use of reserves; and staff's recommendation of approval.

There was discussion regarding: when we will receive the vehicles; and lease versus buy option.

Motion was made by Commissioner Peduzzi, seconded by Commissioner Lambert, to approve Resolution No. 69-22(F); and thereafter it was voted as follows: Ayes: Commissioners Peduzzi, Lambert, Shoaf and Warren. Motion therefore carried unanimously.

8.2. Resolution No. 74-22 approving a new cooperation agreement between the City of West Palm Beach and HCI College for student training in paramedic and emergency medical technician programs.

Jaime Walker, Division Chief, stated that this is a request to renew the internship program that we have with HCI. She said that the approval of this program will allow EMT and Paramedic students to continue training under the direction of our highly trained and experienced paramedics. She said that it is an invaluable experience for the students and there is no fiscal impact to the City.

Commissioner Shoaf asked if agreements like this a good tool to recruit firefighters in the future.

Ms. Walker responded yes, as when they do ride times with us it gives us the opportunity to show them what fire services are about, and that West Palm Beach is known to be highly trained.

Motion was made by Commissioner Peduzzi, seconded by Commissioner Lambert, to approve Resolution No. 74-22; and thereafter it was voted as follows: Ayes: Commissioners Peduzzi, Lambert, Shoaf and Warren. Motion therefore carried unanimously.

Kevin Volbrecht, Director of Engineering Services, discussed the resolutions requested by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) on the traffic detours for the FDOT Southern Boulevard (SR80) bridge rehabilitation project. He said that Resolution No. 77-22 will allow the Engineering Services Director to authorize these detours in the future.

Commissioner Lambert asked if these detours would create a conflict.

Mr. Volbrecht said that there are no conflicts for these detours. He said that there is a Committee that reviews these detours and have done so in this case.

Commissioner Lambert asked about the communication about these detours, especially in Spanish.

Mr. Volbrecht said that is handled by FDOT in coordination with the City.

Mayor James said that if they need our assistance to let us know and we will assist with communication in Spanish.

Motion was made by Commissioner Lambert, seconded by Commissioner Shoaf, to approve Resolution No. 76-22 and Resolution No. 77-22; and thereafter it was voted as follows: Ayes: Commissioners Peduzzi, Lambert, Shoaf and Warren. Motion therefore carried unanimously.

8.4. Resolution No. 88-22 amending existing parking rates and hours of

Edward Davis, Parking Systems Administrator, discussed the downtown parking rate restructure as follows: introduction-impacts of parking rates being too low, reason for parking fees; metered parking-Clematis improvement impacts; current on street parking rates comparisons; current off street (garage parking) rates; off street (garage parking); on street parking rates re-structure; parking rates restructure; off street (garage) rate re-structure; community engagement; benefits of proposed rate structure; future upgrades/maintenance; citation fines (current); WPB proposed citation fines; and proposed monthly parking permit rates.

Mayor James asked Mr. Davis to explain about the benefits of making these changes so people will know that it is not about making money. He said that this is about changing behavior as we have been working on this for two years and it is time to implement it.

Mr. Davis said that by changing these rates they are trying to create an atmosphere of compliance.

There was discussion regarding: benefits outweighing the burdens; convenience and availability was more important than price; what has changed from free parking after 7:00 p.m. and on Sunday to start charging for those times; making sure we are not adding a burden to businesses for their employees parking on the street; having credit card options only on Sunday and adding a cash option; and different options to incentivize workers or businesses to offer different modes of transportation.

Public comments were made by Joseph Russo and Raphael Clemente.

Commissioner Lambert asked about the communication plan.

Mr. Davis explained the communication done in preparation of this resolution and what communication will be done going forward on when the changes will take place.

There was discussion regarding adjusting the fees once we see the effects that this will have.

Motion was made by Commissioner Peduzzi, seconded by Commissioner Shoaf, to approve Resolution No. 88-22; and thereafter it was voted as follows: Ayes: Commissioners Peduzzi, Lambert, Shoaf and Warren. Motion therefore carried unanimously.

#### 9. PUBLIC HEARING

Armando Fana, Assistant City Administrator, said that there are no changes since the first reading.

Commissioner Peduzzi thanked the officers that protect our natural areas and said that we need to look to the County to see if they have ordinances in place to protect the natural areas.

City Administrator Johnson said that at first reading Commissioner Peduzzi brought this up and the Mayor directed her to follow-up with the County Administrator on their ordinance. She stated that she has not done that as she and Deputy City Attorney Nancy Urcheck have been communicating about our ordinance and the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). She stated that Ms. Urcheck is comparing our ordinance with an ordinance that she found on the books that the County has to identify where there are gaps. She said that based on Ms. Urcheck's review and determination, she will then craft that correspondence to the County Administrator and will inform the Mayor and the Board.

Motion was made by Commissioner Peduzzi, seconded by Commissioner Shoaf, to approve Ordinance No. 4992-22. The City Clerk read the ordinance by title; and thereafter it was voted as follows: Ayes: Commissioners Peduzzi, Lambert, Shoaf and Warren. Motion therefore carried unanimously.

9.2. Public Hearing and First Reading of Ordinance No. 4973-21 regarding Public Safety Radio Coverage. Establishing standardized in-building radio signal strength levels in compliance with nationally accepted fire codes. Reliable consistent and unobstructed radio signal transmission and reception within buildings located in the city is necessary to provide public safety services.

Commissioner Shoaf asked about the P25 system and how they go about the process.

Captain Clarke said that the City currently has the P25 system, and we are trying to establish the P25 signal. He said that not every business owner will be affected, only modern larger buildings.

Motion was made by Commissioner Peduzzi, seconded by Commissioner Shoaf, to approve Ordinance No. 4973-21. The City Clerk read the ordinance by title; and thereafter it was voted as follows: Ayes: Commissioners Peduzzi, Lambert, Shoaf and Warren. Motion therefore carried unanimously.

10.1. Resolution No. 66-22: Regarding a Major Amendment to The Marina Commercial Marine Planned Development to modify the Design Guidelines specifically relating to the required setbacks and maximum encroachment allowed within Permissible Building Areas (PBAs) #1 and #2, as well as amend the existing Development Order conditions pertaining to improvements on 40th Street.

Joshua Long, of the Gunster law firm, discussed the previously approved Master Plan. He said that the amendment will allow them to build a drop off for the tower and will allow them to construct an open area Tiki Hut for the Beach Club. He said that the changes will be in the Design Guidelines and showed the affected area. He explained the changes made at the request of the School District as to Northboro Elementary School and said that they will leave 40<sup>th</sup> Street one-way.

John Roach, Principal Planner, said that Mr. Long covered everything in the detail of the request. He discussed further changes to 40<sup>th</sup> Street and other safety improvements that will be made as part of the Development Order. He said that staff recommends approval and the Planning Board also recommended approval.

The City Clerk swore in Ron Davis.

Public comment was made by Ron Davis.

Motion was made by Commissioner Shoaf, seconded by Commissioner Lambert, to approve Resolution No. 66-22, approving a Major Amendment to The Marina Commercial Marine Planned Development to modify the Design Guidelines specifically relating to the required

Commissioner Warren expressed condolences to Commissioner Fox and her family. She acknowledged Commissioner Shoaf for this being her last meeting and said that she appreciates all the things that she brings to this body. She mentioned speaking with ladies on Delta Day on Saturday.

Commissioner Shoaf expressed condolences to Commissioner Fox and her family. She congratulated Commissioner-elect Ward.

Mayor James expressed condolences to Commissioner Fox and her family on the loss of her mother. He said that today we will wind down the COVID testing site at Gaines Park and the EOC will continue to monitor COVID data. He provided the following updates: Rudolph Galindo as the new LGBTQ Liaison; Spring egg hunt on April 16<sup>th</sup> at Howard Park; ribbon cutting for renovations for Bryan Chapel and Mickens Parks; in preparation of hurricane season vegetation amnesty days May 2-13, 2022; congratulations to the Green Market for being number 1 for a second consecutive year. He said that he will miss the swearing in ceremony on March 31<sup>st</sup> as he will be out of the country and paid tribute to Commissioner Shoaf for her service.
